

The Ofir Shwartz Trio is a progressive piano trio, performing music composed by the pianist Ofir Shwartz. The music of the trio is written and played with a unique approach; using the sounds and inspiration of European Jazz with the influences of modern harmony. From classical music and feel, through rock up to drum n'base vibes.

The Trio was founded in 2006 by Ofir Shwartz in order to bring to life Ofir's compositions and vision. During these years the Ofir Shwartz Trio got great reputation as they performed in many International Jazz Festivals and rewarded with great feedbacks by the media and the crowd. Their debut album "Earlier in Time" (sHmoo Records) was released in 2010 and received great reviews. The album is distributed in USA, Japan and Israel. Their second album "Shades of Fish" will be released in mid 2013 accompanied by a world tour.

The Ofir Shwartz Trio consists of three talented international musicians:

Ofir Shwartz (Israel) - Piano

His excellent playing captures the listener's ears with colorful melodies and harmonies, along with his unique rhythmic structures

Gasper Bertoncelj (Slovenia) – Drums

With his international vast experience gasper is a master of brushes as well as a very melodic drummer and extremely versatile.

Gal Shaya (Israel / N.Y.) - Double Bass

An emerging talent among modern jazz fans, a catchy bass player with fantastic groove along with terrific soloing.



For the second time Ofir Shwartz has gathered his fantastic trio in order to record a new album, resulting the inspiring release -"Shades of Fish" (Hevhetia Records, 2013).

Since the release of the Trio's debut album - "Earlier in Time" (sHmoo Records 2010), the trio went through a journey seeking new sound and inspiration to create an album which will bring new spirit to modern jazz.

This time the trio takes the listener to a very different musical experience, adding Heavy Rock-ish style into their repertoire without forgetting their gentle melodic origins. This album consists of Piano recorded with heavy Distortion side by side with mellow ballads and

flowing melodic tunes.

"I found listening to this album a heartwarming experience for several reasons; the fact that three young Israeli musicians are capable of playing with such elegance, eloquence and maturity is truly astounding. Combined with the depth of the pianist's compositions, which are mostly lyrical and introvert, the overall impression is deeply moving. The music is much closer to European Jazz than to its American roots, reminiscent of Nordic and East European schools of Jazz composition. Mostly quite precise and well organized; the music sometimes glides into freely improvised passages, which albeit being brief, put it in an entirely new context. The rhythm section gives a perfectly solid support to the soloist, filling in the blanks and complimenting his performances without being intrusive. The interplay between the three musicians is perfectly balanced and respectful, which is a basis of every great piano trio. Shwartz isn't trying to be overtly virtuosic in his performance, preferring subtlety and subtext to flashy, but meaningless glissandos and arpeggios. Every keystroke is precisely where it belongs, both musically and rhythmically, which is of course the way good music is supposed to be. Beautifully recorded, with a clear and warm resonance and perfect sonic balance between the instruments, this is an album every Jazz connoisseur should enjoy in full. The fact that it comes from our petite country is definitely a source of pride and joy for people like me, who care about our culture. Wholeheartedly recommended!"
